North Star Charter School 2015-2016 ISAT Information/Results

During the 2015-2016 school year North Star Charter School participated in the ISAT summative assessment through the Smarter Balanced Consortium.

The ISAT summative assessment is an important component of the statewide student assessment system as stated in the board rule 08.02.03-Rules Governing Thoroughness. The ISAT tests are administered to students in grades 3-11 to provide ongoing monitoring of individual, school, district, and state progress. One component of the ISAT required for high school graduation is the 10th grade assessment in English Language Arts / Literacy and Mathematics. Proficiency on the 10th grade ISATs verifies that an Idaho student has met Idaho Core Standards in these content areas.

Academic proficiency is more than test scores. Competency in all academic areas is the goal for every child.

Components of the ISATs

The ISAT is composed of English Language Arts/Literacy and Mathematics tests for grades 3-11 that address the Idaho Core Standards and Science tests for grades 5, 7, and 10, which address the Idaho Science Standards. A variety of item types are used to assess what a student knows and what they can do with that knowledge. The items address a variety of skill levels, from short-term recall of facts to skills and problem solving.

The ISAT summative assessment was administered during the last 8 weeks of the school year. It consists of two parts: a computer adaptive test and performance tasks taken on a computer. The assessment:

- Accurately describes both student achievement and growth of student learning as part of program evaluation and school, district, and the state accountability system;
- Provides valid, reliable, and fair measures of students' progress toward, and attainment of the knowledge and skills required to be college- and careerready; and capitalizes on the strengths of computer adaptive testingefficient and precise measurement across the full range of achievement with quick turnaround of results.

English Language Arts/Literacy Assessments

The ELA/Literacy assessments are composed of items that address Idaho Core Standards in grades 3-11. There are four reporting categories known as Claims. The Claims represent what we know to be true about a student's performance in the areas of Reading, Writing, Speaking and Listening, if we see specific evidence.

Mathematics Assessment

The ISAT mathematics assessment is composed of items that address Idaho Core Standards for grades 3-11. There are three reporting areas known as Claims. The Claims represent what we know to be true about a student's performance in the areas of mathematics if we see specific evidence.

Results

The results are reported to parents by where there student falls with determined cut scores. There are 4 levels which are described below. While making the shift for the old ISAT's we can compare the levels as 4- Advanced, 3- Proficient, 2- Basic and 1-Below Basic.

Level 4 The student has exceeded the achievement standard and demonstrates advanced progress toward mastery of the knowledge and skills in English language arts/literacy needed for likely success in future coursework.

Level 3 The student has met the achievement standard and demonstrates progress toward mastery of the knowledge and skills in English language arts/literacy needed for likely success in future coursework.

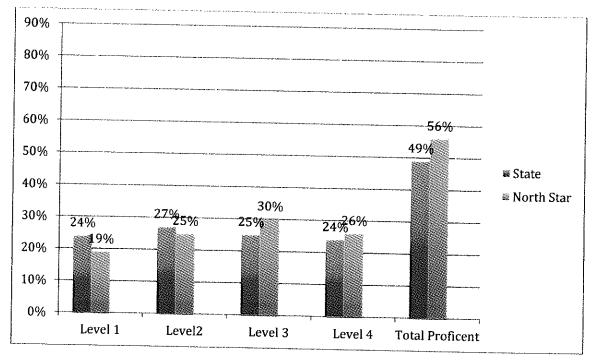
Level 2 The student has nearly met the achievement standard and may require further development to demonstrate the knowledge and skills in English language arts/literacy needed for likely success in future coursework.

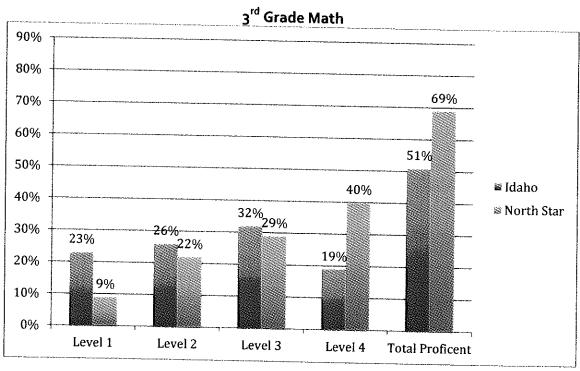
Level 1 The student has not met the achievement standard and needs substantial improvement to demonstrate the knowledge and skills in English language arts/literacy needed for likely success in future coursework.

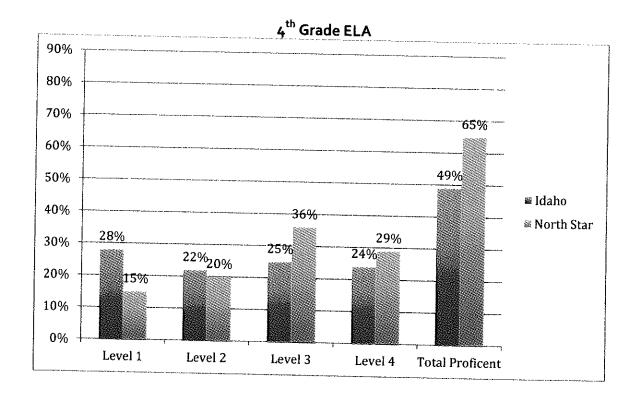

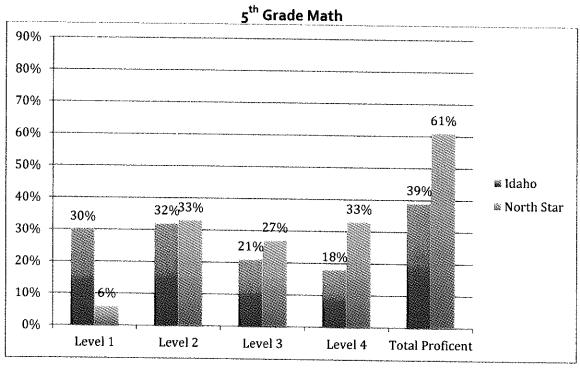


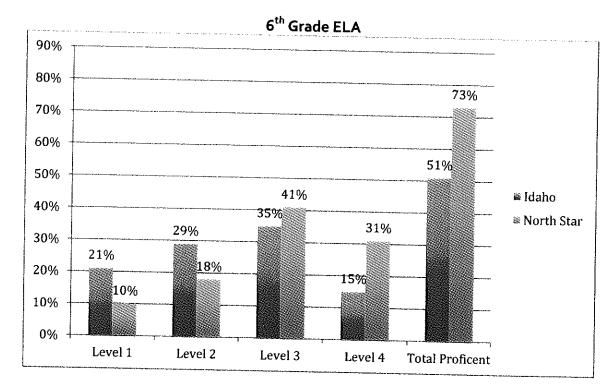


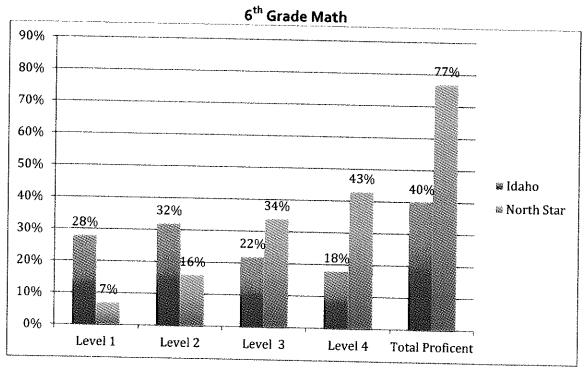


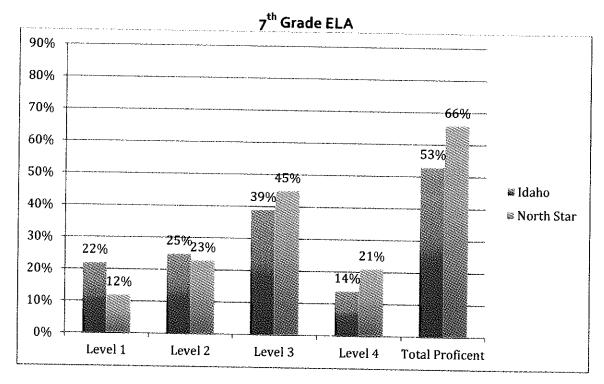


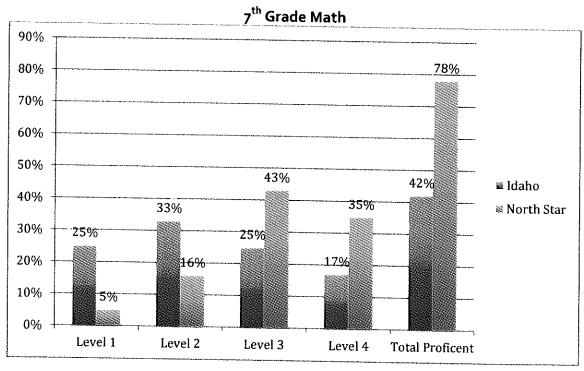


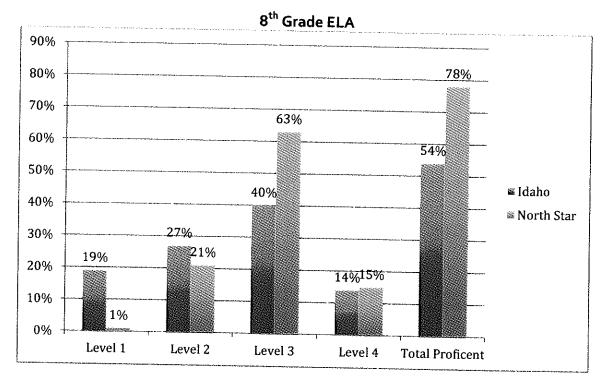


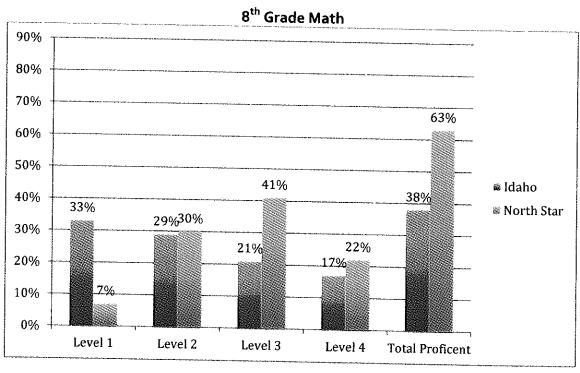


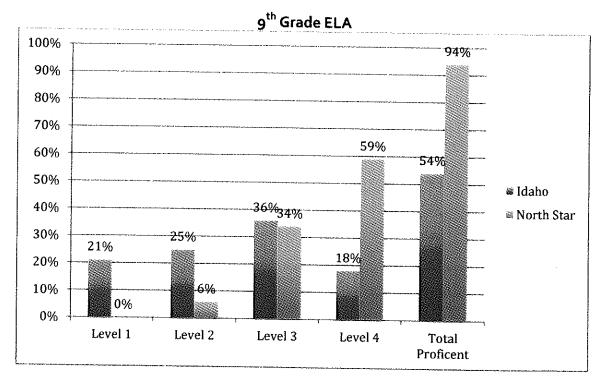


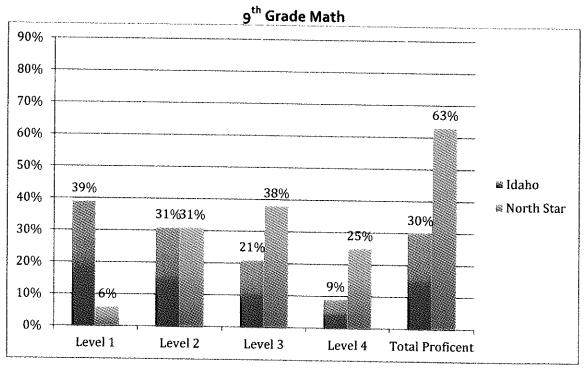


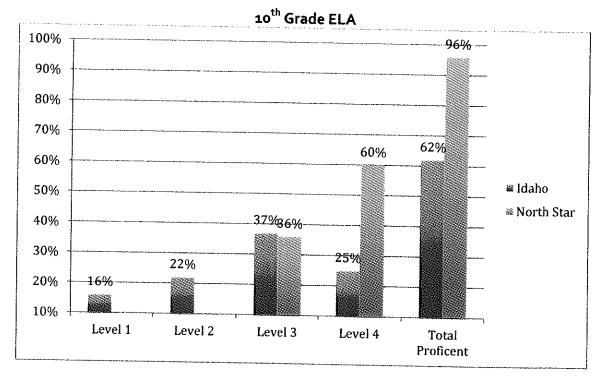


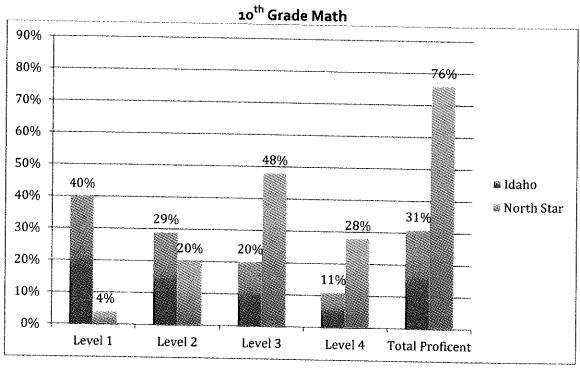












ISAT Summary:

North Star Charter School 2015-2016 IRI Information/Results

North Star students in K-3 participated in the Idaho Reading Indicator (IRI) in the Fall of 2015 and Spring of 2016 for the 2015-2016 school year.

Idaho Statute 33-1614 requires K-3 students in Idaho to be assessed as they develop critical reading skills. The purpose of the assessment, the Idaho Reading Indicator (IRI), is to indicate which children are most likely going to be at-risk of failure with skills that are prerequisite for being successful readers throughout life. As is written in the statute, "the state K-3 assessment test results shall be reviewed by school personnel for the purpose of providing necessary interventions to sustain or improve the students' reading skills."

Results

The results are reported to parents by where there student falls with determined cut scores. There are 3 levels:

Benchmark or 3- reading skills at or above grade level

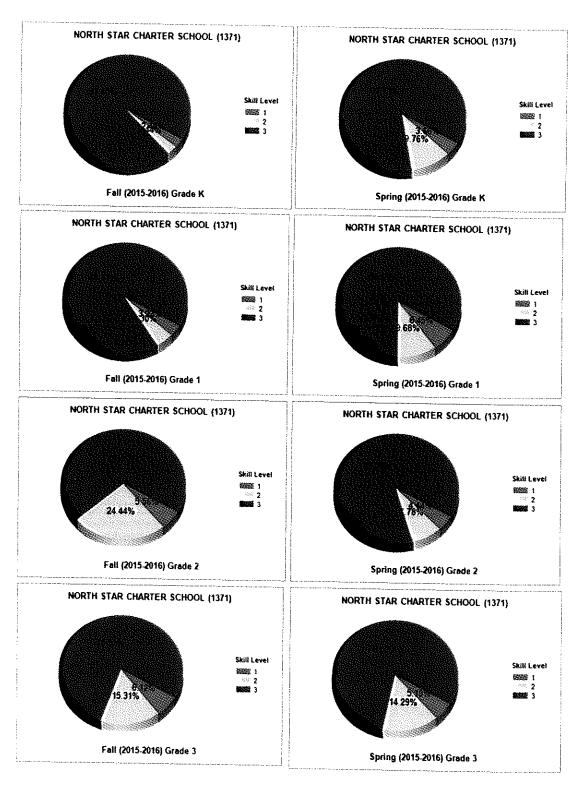
Strategic or 2- reading skills near grade level

Intensive or 1- reading skills below grade level

In Kindergarten students are assessed with two different assessments Letter Naming Fluency (LNF) and Letter Sound Fluency (LSF) in both the Fall and the Spring. However in the Fall only the LNF score is reported to the SDE and only the LSF in the Spring. Therefore it is hard to make a comparison on growth from Fall to Spring using the state data. With further analysis using our own benchmark assessments we can see that the students are making adequate growth.

In 1st Grade students are assessed with two different assessments Letter Sound Fluency (LSF) and Correct Words Per Minute (CWPM). However in the Fall only the LSF score is reported to the SDE and the CWPM in the Spring. Therefore it is hard to make a comparison on the growth from Fall to Spring using the state data. With further analysis using our own benchmark assessments we can see that the students are making adequate growth.

On the following pages you can find the results/comparison of grades K thru 3rd Fall and Spring IRI assessment.



IRI Summary: We are pleased to see the growth that our students continue to make. We are very pleased with the growth that 2^{nd} grade made from Fall to Spring this year.

Here is a brief overview of what we have been doing the last couple of years to ensure that our students are making adequate growth. The next board meeting the Elementary and Secondary Principals will present action plan for the 2016-2017 school year.

2014-2015 school year

- K-5 teachers worked on math curriculum by researching current best practices, investigated curriculums for possible implementation and curricular structures for alignment, wrote instructional guides as resource tools for curricular enhancement and alignment, and began implementation of curricular goals and frameworks as aligned with Core Standards in PLC's this year.
- 6-12 Math Teachers met 2 days this year to align math curriculum by researching current best practices, investigate curriculums for possible implementation and curricular structures for alignment, this year with new Core Standards.
- 7-8 Reading, Language, Social Studies met once a month to discuss curriculum alignment and core standards.

2015 Summer:

- 7th Graders going into 8th Grade were offered math instruction 3 days per week for 2 hours per day to help close some gaps that students were showing. This is being done by our new 7th -8th grade math teacher Krystal Ellis.
- 11th Graders going into 12th Grade were offered additional math instruction to help ease some frustration and stress by Vickie Woodward one of our IB Math teachers.
- 6-12 ELA teachers met for two half days to analyze data, teachers also begin to look at ELA curriculum by researching current best practices; investigate curriculums for possible implementation and curricular structures for alignment.
- K-12 Science began the discussion of via e-mail; a K-12 alignment document and a draft version of the new Idaho State Science Standards. Dr. Hettinger started an alignment document, for all to make comments and additions too. They are also looking at what materials we currently have available to us at North Star and what materials they will need to purchase (in the future) to reach complete alignment.

2015-2016 School Year:

K-5 teachers continued to look at Math curriculum to make sure they are closing any holes with Core Standards in PLC's and make adjustments as needed.

- K-5 teachers began to look at ELA curriculum by researching current best practices, investigate curriculums for possible implementation and curricular structures for alignment in PLC's this year.
- K-5 teachers implemented a devoted 45 minutes 4 days per week for ELA enrichment where students received instruction at the instructional level.
- 6-12 Math teachers worked in PLC's to continue look at current best practices, began implementation of CPM curriculum in Grades 7th-10th and began working on Math department goals.
- 6-12 ELA teachers continued to look at ELA curriculum by researching current best practices, and developed curricular structures for alignment in PLC's this year.
- K-12 Science teachers have continued the curriculum discussions with Dr. Hettinger leading them out.
